- 1) Are the authors arguing that we stop doing trellis work and start doing vine work? Defend your answer using their words in the book. (pg. 17)
- 2) What are some of the problems with "event-based" evangelism, and what are some solutions to this problem? (pg. 18, paragraph 4 pg. 19, paragraph 2)
- 3) What does it look like for a ministry to be in "maintenance mode"? How is training the solution to this problem instead of "gap-filling"? (pg. 20, paragraph 4 pg. 21, paragraph 1)
- 4) Why do ministries become "problem-focused," and what is the mind-shift that needs to take place here? (pg. 22, paragraphs 2-4)

Evaluate

- 1) Read and study 1 Corinthians 2:1-5.
 - a. What was Paul's strategy for seeing souls saved and disciples made in Corinth?
 - b. Why is human weakness, rather than strength, such an important part of ministering the gospel?
- 2) Think of one or two ministries at West Side Church that you are a part of or care deeply about.
 - a. Are people seen as a necessary means of keeping the ministry going? Or is the ministry seen as existing for the training, equipping, and building of disciples? Why?

	b.	If the ministry mind-shifts described in this chapter successfully took place, how might it affect the way that this ministry operates?
Apply 1) As	s you	think through the mind-shifts, what parts of your thinking need to be transformed?
